3.26 Major Activities during the year in the sphere of extension activities and Institutional Social Responsibility.

- Gandhi Jayanti was observed by the Extension Education Cell of the college on 2<sup>nd</sup> October, 2015. Cleanliness drive was implemented by the students in the college campus and the market area of the town. The students also performed street plays on the benefits of cleanliness.
- An Awareness Programme was organized by Value Based Education Cell in Chaukuri L. P. School on 15<sup>th</sup> October, 2015 on Global Hand Washing Day. In the programme the children of the school were advised to wash their hands with soap and the technique of hand washing was taught to them. Dr. P.G. Agarwala. The Headmaster, teachers, students and some local people of the village were present on the occasion.
- 14 Rovers and 7 Rangers with 2 Leaders of the college participated in the Inter State Hiking Programme at Delhi, Agra, Shimla from 21.10.2015 to 02.11.2015. The Programme included Rock Climbing and Mountaineering Course.
- The Flag Day of Scouts and Guides was observed on 7<sup>th</sup> November, 2015 in the college campus. The Rovers and Rangers of the college cleaned the college campus under Swacha Bharat Abhiyan.
- The School Adoption Committee of Sapatgram College adopted the Silghagri L.P.School (Provisionally Government Aided) established in 1980 located at Silghagri Village under Kadamtola Gram Panchayat on 29.12.2015. 1 Blackboard, 1 Table, 2 Benches, Exercise Books for students, 1 Football, 6 C.I Sheets were provided to the school for uplifting the infrastructure of the school. Art Competition was conducted and prizes were awarded for inculcating artistic temperament in the children.
- The Rovers and Rangers of the college took part as volunteers in the SouthAsian Games organized at Guwahati and Shillong from 06.02.2016.
- Thinking Day was observed on 22<sup>nd</sup> February, 2016, the birth anniversary of Lord Stephen Baden Powell and his wife Lady Baden Powell in the college campus. An All Faith Prayer Meeting was organised on the day. A cultural function was organised by the Rangers and Rovers of the college.
- International Women's Day was observed on 8<sup>th</sup> March, 2016 organized by Women Cell, Sapatgram College in collaboration with Dhubri Zonal Women's Cell and Brihottar Sapatgram Mahila Yeikya Mancha in the college. A seminar on "Women Empowerment" was held. An Art Competition of school and college students was held on the day. A rally of the girl students and members of Yeikya Mancha was organized through the town and adjoining villages. Street plays about the rights of women were

- performed by the students. A cultural programme was organized by the students.
- Rabindra Jayanti was observed on 9<sup>th</sup> May, 2016. The Principal and the teachers of the Department of Bengali spoke on the contribution of Rabindranath Tagore to Indian Literature. More than 150 students and teachers participated in the Programme.
- Anti Terrorism Day was observed in the college on 21.05.2016. It was organized by the Value Based Education Cell. A Lecture Session was held on the day. The speakers included Mr. S. k. Panigrahi, Mr. N.I.Mondal, Dr. G. K. Saha & Dr. K. K. Roy.
- World Environment Day was observed by Extension Education Cell, Sapatgram College on 5<sup>th</sup> June, 2016 with a day-long programme in Hatasora village near Pratapkhata. There was plantation programme in the village. The students organized a rally in the village with placards for inculcating awareness in the public about environmental pollution and its degradation. Street plays were also performed by the students with the same purpose. The general public was advised to ban plastic in their day-to-day life.
- 2<sup>nd</sup> International Yoga Day was observed in the college by the Value Based Education Cell on 21<sup>st</sup> June, 2016 in the Indoor Stadium. More than 100 students participated in the programme. Mr. N. I. Mondal and Mr. Akhil Das spoke on the value and benefits of yoga and advised the students to make it a part of their daily life. Mr. A. Das demonstrated some yoga postures and the students performed them. As it is, the Value Based Education Cell organizes yoga classes every Sunday in the college campus.
- International Day Against Drug Abuse was organized by the Value Based Education Cell, Sapatgram College in collaboration with Civil Administration, Bilasipara and Sapatgram Town Committee on 26.06.2016. A rally of school and college students and teachers with placards and banners was organized in the morning from Sapatgram Town Committee Office to Sapatgram College through the town. Slogans were shouted regarding the evil effects of drugs on the society. A Lecture Session was organized in the college at 11.00 A.M on the evil effects of drugs. The speakers included Mr. S.K.Panigrahi, Mr. Enamul Hussain, EAC, Bilasipara, Mr. N. I. Mondal, Mr. M. H. Choudhury, Mrs. Minati Sarkar, Chairperson, STC and Mr. G.Saha, Headmaster, Sapatgram Bengali High School.

#### 5.6 Details of student counselling and career guidance

Career Counselling Cell, Sapatgram College organizes workshops for students on choice of subjects in General & Major courses for the applicants for U.G. courses and for fresh graduates on career options. 
