#### 5.6 Details of student counselling and career guidance

Career Counselling Cell, Sapatgram College organizes workshops for students on choice of subjects in General & Major courses for the applicants for U.G. courses and for fresh graduates on career options. Besides, the students are informed about different advertisements on jobs through the Notice Board of the cell. The cell also guides the students regarding applying for the jobs in different sectors. The Cell remains active throughout the year.

- A workshop on "Choice of Subjects for Applicants to Degree Courses" was organized by the Career Counselling Cell, Sapatgram College, on 22-06-2016 for the applicants for Degree course, 2016-17. - 6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:
  - 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The college follows the curriculum prescribed by Gauhati University. Hence, there is no scope for innovation in curricular design. But in the field of curriculum transaction, new measures were adopted so as to make the process of teaching learning more adequate, absorbing, knowledge oriented and socially directed. 

# The Best Practices

# 1. Students' Participation in Extension Activities

#### Goal:

- The college planned to involve more number of students in the extension activities organized by the different cells with the objective of acquainting them with the real problems of the society.
- Such an effort would help in the development of the neighbourhood and also strengthen the bondage between the institution and neighbourhood.
- It would promote in the students the values of love for humanity, selfless service and quality of leadership.

#### The Context:

- Institution-neighbourhood relationship is one of the key relationships that an institution should value highly. By establishing such a relationship an institution can serve its responsibility to the society.
- The responsibility of an educational institution to the society does not remain limited only to educating the people about cleanliness, healthy life, government welfare schemes, gender issues and environmental degradation. It has to come forward with some projects and set an example before the general people as to how to achieve such objectives.

#### The Practice:

- Extension activities had been a part of the activities of Sapatgram College since the beginning. But the IQAC, Sapatgram College wanted to involve more and more number of students in the extension activities in 2003. With the introduction of the Scouts and Guides Unit in the college, the participation of students in such activities increased manifold. With the introduction of NSS in 2014-15, the participation of students in such activities has increased.
- On every International Women's Day on 8<sup>th</sup> March, the Women Cell organizes Lecture Sessions, Seminars, and Workshops on women's issues in the college and in the neighbourhood. Health Camps for women are organized with the help of Medical Officers of the locality. Free medicines are also distributed. The teachers and students organize rallies with placards on gender equality and street plays are performed against the exploitation of women and dowry system.
- On every World Environment Day on 5<sup>th</sup> June Lecture Sessions on the preservation of environment are conducted by the Extension Education Cell. Plantation Programmes in the college and the neighbourhood are undertaken. The teachers and students organize rallies with placards on environmental degradation and street plays are performed to educate the general people to check environmental pollution.
- On every Global Hand Washing Day on 15<sup>th</sup> October the Value Based Education Cell of the college organizes camps in the schools of the locality with the help of Medical Officers on proper methods of hand washing and on cleanliness.
- The Rovers and Rangers of the college are deployed in the maintenance of law and order in the meetings and festivals organized in the locality.

#### **Impact of the Process:**

- Encouraging participation of students in the extension activities undertaken by the college has proved to
  be one of the best practices to have been adopted by the college. The practice has generated much
  enthusiasm in the students.
- The practice has also nurtured in the students a number of qualities which are very much useful to them in practical life.
- The practice has resulted in respect for the opposite sex as boys and girls have to work together in close harmony during such activities.

# **Problems Encountered and Resources required:**

- Practically no major problem has been encountered as the teachers and students extend their sincere cooperation in such activities.
- Bihattor Sapatgram Mahila Yeikyo Mancha; Sub-Divisional Administration, Bilasipara; Nehru Yuva Kendra, Dhubri; Sapatgram Town Committee and the Medical Officers of the locality extend their help voluntarily in organizing such activities.
- Some funds required for organizing such extension activities are met by the college.

# 2. Introduction of IDOL and KKHSOU Study Centres

#### Goal:

- Sapatgram College would like to provide higher education in the distance mode to the general public of the locality who are employed, semi-employed and do not have time to be the regular students of the institution.
- It would like to provide postgraduate education to the students who do not get seats in the postgraduate institutes in towns and cities and those who do not have financial resources to meet the ever growing living costs in the cities.
- It would like to provide such education at a very nominal fee which will be within the means of this economically backward region.

#### The Context:

- Learning is a life-long activity which need not be restricted to institutional learning only. It has to cross the rigid boundaries of educational institutions and reach the common man of the street. Herein lies the significance of distance learning.
- Open and Distance Learning is a system wherein teachers and learners need not necessarily be present either at same place or same time and is flexible in regard to modalities and timing of teaching and learning as also the admission criteria without compromising necessary quality considerations.
- This is becoming more and more significant for continuing education, skill updation of in service
  personnel and for quality education of relevance to learners located at educationally disadvantageous
  locations.

#### The Practice:

- Sapatgram College introduced Postgraduate Courses in Assamese, Bengali, English, Political Science, Economics, Education, History, Sanskrit, Philosophy and Mathematics through Institute of Distance and Open Learning, Gauhati University in 2013-14 with the goal of providing higher education at this educationally and economically backward rural area at a low cost.
- It wanted to offer the benefit of postgraduate education to the graduates who do not get seats in the universities and those who do not have the financial capacity to afford such education.
- Sapatgram College introduced undergraduate courses through distance mode under Krishna Kanta Handique State Open University in 2014-15 for the general learners who could not avail the benefit of higher education due to various reasons including financial ones.
- Classes are conducted every Sunday in the college campus as per the guidelines of KKHSOU. Some classes on every subject are organized with the faculty of the college and of the neighbouring colleges.

#### **Impact of the Practice:**

- The postgraduate programme in the distance mode has proved to be one of the best practices to have been adopted by the college. The programme has proved to be so successful that the enrolment has increased manifold.
- The undergraduate programme under KKHSOU has also proved to be a great success. Many housewives and employed/ semi-employed learners of the locality have enrolled themselves in the programme.
- The programmes have generated much enthusiasm among the general public and the youth population of the locality because these programmes have given them an opportunity to go for higher education at a nominal cost without affecting their employment.

#### **Problems encountered and Resources required:**

Practically no problem was faced in introducing IDOL and KKHSOU Study Centers in the college. The
universities send the study materials in time which are issued to the students.

- The faculty members wholeheartedly take the classes on Sundays.
- The college had to construct an Office for Distance Learning in the college. The funds required for its construction was met by the contingency amount provided by the universities.
